Enrollment Questions

Q1. If we choose Edmentum and the school eventually moves to the hybrid model, can my kids switch to the hybrid model?

Students/Families will have the flexibility to choose which academic option meets their child(ren). Changes may occur after the present term (~9 weeks). Change of placement must be communicated to the residential building team and the E-Learning team to discuss appropriate action for each student. Parents/guardians must communicate with the building administration and LCSD Online Coordinator when pursuing child enrollment changes.

Q2. Do we get to choose if our student gets Exact Path or Study Island? Are they both part of Edmentum?

To meet students' needs, all elementary students in the E-Learning option will be placed in both Study Island and Exact Path. This allows all elementary students access to grade-level/academic level content in four core subjects. Both of these programs are part of Edmentum's Learning Platform.

Q3. Do families get a choice between CDL and Edmentum?

Yes, parents/guardians will determine which learning option best suits their child. Parents/Guardians will choose this option when completing the enrollment process.

Q4. Change between what? Do we have to choose e-learning or Study Island and Exact Path options? This is confusing.

- A. Families/Students choose which learning options they want to enroll in 1. Comprehensive Distance Learning, or 2. E-Learning (online)
- B. Elementary E-Learning - Study Island and Exact Path are the programs that will provide instruction; students will be using both programs.
- C. Secondary E-Learning - Edmentum courseware is the program your child works through.

Q5. Will students get to try both programs to see what a better fit for them is before making their final choice? Will elementary be able to switch during Week 1? I know it's possible each 9 wk quarter?

Families are only able to choose one option when registering their child for school. With that being said, Students/Families have the first week to determine if the educational opportunity (of their choice) meets the needs of their child(ren). See question #1.

Q6. If students are enrolled in the homeschool option, will they still be issued a chrome book?

Homeschooling a child is quite different from our E-Learning/CDL options. There is additional information regarding home school from the LBL ESD [website](#). Students that enroll in the LCSD E-Learning option will be issued an LCSD Chromebook; students must use District Issued Chromebook while participating in instruction.

Q7. Is there any help available to parents who decide to homeschool their children with their own content?

Homeschooling a child is quite different from our E-Learning/CDL options. There is additional information regarding home school from the LBL ESD [website](#).

Q8. If a student accelerates through materials in Exact Path, placing them beyond grade level, what happens when they go back to a hybrid or regular classroom will that work and advanced work be accommodated?

Although Exact Path is Common Core Standards aligned, there are many standards that cannot be addressed deeply within an online-only setting. Students who are moving through Exact Path and find themselves working above grade level in a content area will continue to work on grade-level standards by demonstrating a deeper understanding of the standard and work on additional standards that weren't addressed through the Exact Path program in the classroom setting.

Q9. Will students be able to stay online using Edmentum's Learning Programs even when buildings open back up to traditional education?

Yes, Edmentum learning programs will be available for students (K-12) throughout our county the entire 2020-2021 school year.

Q10. Can my child finish a course faster than the ten weeks and progress to the next "grade" before the semester ends?

Elementary students are able to work at their own pace throughout the Edmentum E-Learning Program. Exact Path provided an individualized learning path based on the student academic level. Study Island provides students with grade-level content that students need in order to build a strong foundational skill set within core subjects.

<p>Secondary students will work directly with their building counselor and administrator on their academic plan and pace. Secondary courses will automatically change at each term.</p>
<p>Q11. If you have a child that was expected into AVID, will they still be able to participate?</p>
<p>AVID is not offered for students through the E-Learning option. AVID will be offered through the CDL option.</p>
<p>Q12. What is the last day to sign up your child for which program?</p>
<p>The preferred date is August 28th.</p>
<p>Q13. How should we handle kindergarten registration?</p>
<p>The process for kindergarten registration in the Lincoln County School District doesn't change. During the registration process, you will be asked to choose between either the LCSD Comprehensive Distance Learning or the Edmentum online-only option.</p>
<p>Curriculum Questions/Scheduling</p>
<p>Q14. Will there be a specific list of classes you have to choose from or all courses listed in Edmentum?</p>
<p>There will be a list of courses that are offered by LCSD through Edmentum's Courseware program. This list will be available no later than 8/14. Schedules will be aligned to graduation requirements and based on student's Spring forecasting. Secondary counselors will be directly involved in the process.</p>
<p>Q15. Are the kids getting enough time to work on a class assignment before the next class starts, or will they have to do all their classwork after school, making a long day every day?</p>
<p>With E-Learning, students/families have the flexibility to schedule their instruction time as they see fit. CDL schedules will have whole group instruction/video, small group, optional office hours, and work time built in their day.</p>
<p>Q.16 What if a student gets their work complete ahead of schedule, why would they need to attend every day?</p>
<p>Elementary CDL students will have new lessons each day to engage in with accompanying independent practice work. Edmentum students will be asked to engage with the programs (Exact Path/Study Island) at some point during each school day.</p>

Secondary CDL students will work directly with their teacher on differentiation and pacing, just like in a regular classroom. Edmentum students who complete early will work directly with their building counselor to continue their academic pathway. Official attendance requirements from the Oregon Department of Education will be released on August 11th.

Q17. Is Edmentum completely self-paced for Elementary? TAG for Elementary?

Both Exact Path and Study Island learning platforms are self-paced. Students receive an individualized learning path in Exact Path and grade-level content in Study Island. Students are able to receive enrichment and above grade level content within Exact Path depending on the diagnostic assessment data.

Q18. Are we choosing an Edmentum path or doing both? If both, does this mean they would do two math and two reading classes daily? If an incoming 7th/8th grader is hopeful to be placed in advanced math, how is this addressed? What part of Edmentum would 8th graders be enrolled in/offered? What about middle school?

Elementary K-6 students will use both Edmentum programs (Study Island and Exact Path). Exact Path's learning platform is an individualized learning program that meets students' academic level, where Study Islands' focus is grade-specific proficiency. Edmentum's Courseware program is in place for 7-12 students and works with a guidance counselor to establish student schedules. If an 8th-grade student's learning path has them needing a high school math course, they would be placed in a high school math course in Edmentum.

Q19. Are families able to work with someone on the leveling testing? Will we have access to staff that can work with us on these types of problems?

Elementary students should complete diagnostic tests, mastery assessments, etc. on their own to gain certain academic skill levels. All of Edmentum's learning programs offer help buttons that provide information to help parents and students navigate these portals.
Secondary students will have opportunities to attend scheduled office hours each week for support in specific courses.

Q20. What if you work and have to travel while the class is going?

The E-Learning option allows students and parents to create daily schedules that work for their personal needs.

Q21. Can parents customize courses, like taking a foreign language?

Parents are not able to customize student courses. The guidance counselor works with secondary (7-12) students to establish course needs and selects classes

reflective of student graduation requirements, post-secondary goals, and program offerings.

Q22. With Edmentum, does a student still have access to a high school guidance counselor to ensure they are getting the classes /credits they need and staying on track with specific graduation and college requirements? Who will be helping with those particular needs for our high schoolers regardless of which program they choose?

The guidance counselor will continue to work with secondary students to establish course needs and select classes that reflect student graduation requirements and post-secondary goals. Both CDL and Edmentum students must work directly with their guidance counselor when building their term schedules.

Q23. How are elective classes supposed to work out, seeing as how they are still required to graduate for students?

The guidance counselor works with secondary students to establish course needs and select classes that reflect student graduation requirements and post-secondary goals. Although Edmentum and CDL secondary electives are not the same, both will meet Oregon Diploma requirements.

Q24. Can I use edmentum to graduate early?

Yes, graduating early is possible. This needs to be discussed with your resident building guidance counselor and administrator. Our guidance counselors work with students to ensure graduation requirements are being met. Every student's circumstance is different, and our guidance counselors and administrators can determine this possibility.

Q25. Is the middle school using Study Island/Exact Path or a different program from Edmentum? It would help when we go looking for info on the edmentum website.

Middle school students (7th-8th) will use Edmentum's Courseware learning program.

Q26. Will they be online all day for their classes like a typical full day of school, or will they be timed?

Elementary: Students who are enrolled in Edmentum should be working in both programs Exact Path (individual learning path) and Study Island (grade-level content) to ensure students are accessing content requirements.

<p>Secondary: The Edmentum program tracks time on task but does not have a set minute requirement or schedule. CDL students will have a set schedule. Watch for sample schedules to be posted soon.</p>
<p>Q27. Will school hours and home hours be the same?</p>
<p>No, CDL students have a daily schedule created by the building team, while Edmentum online learners have the flexibility to develop their plans for instruction. Online learners will be monitored through our district's ability to run a variety of reports. Students are expected to be working towards the completion of their learning programs daily.</p>
<p>Q28. Will students have to be logged on at specific times for comprehensive distance learning? What is the precise schedule for when a high school student is expected to be online with CDL?</p>
<p>Yes, students will have specific schedules to ensure all students' instructional needs are met. Secondary buildings will be creating schedules for CDL students.</p>
<p>Q29. For parents that work during the week who might not have help, can they do their classes on the weekend? If school is closed, can they still progress online?</p>
<p>Families/Students have access to all E-Learning programs via Edmentum 24 hours a day/7 days a week. Only secondary Edmentum assessments need to be scheduled during regular school hours for proctoring (online or in the building when allowed).</p>
<p>Q30. How long should parents expect students to be online during the online E-Learning day?</p>
<p>Elementary: Students should participate in daily instruction on average, 20-40 minutes per day/per subject, depending on their child's age. Secondary: CDL sample schedules will be posted. Edmentum student work time varies on a student by student basis. The program runs at an independent pace, but the term/course end dates follow the CDL calendar.</p>
<p>Program/Tech/Support Questions:</p>
<p>Q31. Do students in Edmentum get meals on the bus? Who can we speak to about this? Is public opinion welcome in your meals meeting? Will students who are forced to go the homeschool route not receive food?</p>
<p>At this time there is not a lot of information, please know our District Leadership Team members and Superintendent are working hard to make sure distribution of food is to</p>

<p>all LCSD students enrolled in either CDL or Edmentum learning option. As we gain more information we will let our stakeholders know.</p>
<p>Q32. Would families receive another computer for more than one child in Edmentum?</p>
<p>Yes, LCSD is committed to providing district issued chromebooks to all students.</p>
<p>Q33. Is there a demo code for parents to be able to test it before committing? Where can families access examples of this curriculum? Are there examples of the curriculum for Edmentum online?</p>
<p>At this time we do not have parent demo codes, but there are multiple resources online: Search keywords: Edmentum: Courseware, Exact Path, Study Island.</p>
<p>Q34. Can edmentum parents in TAG or choose another language? Electives at elementary?</p>
<p>Electives are not offered at the Elementary level for E-Learning enrollment option.</p>
<p>Q35. Do we still have to pay the tech fee if we are not using a school provided chromebook?</p>
<p>LCSD issued technology is testing in Edmentum when working within our online program, unless an individual education plan (IEP) makes an exception or a proctored schedule time is made at the building. Our district has invested in our technologies in order for our Chromebooks to meet the system requirements of Edmentum.</p>
<p>Q36. How is LCSD planning on supporting students and families with challenges accessing the internet and may not have cell phone service to support a hotspot?</p>
<p>Pioneer Connect, WAVE, and Spectrum have programs available to assist with broadband internet access. The district can provide hotspots that work on the Sprint/T-Mobile network or the AT&T network. There is at least one school in each area where WIFI can be accessed from outside the school.</p>
<p>Q37 What resources (technical and otherwise) do we need to provide at home?</p>
<p>Student basic needs would consist of LCSD issued Chromebook and reliable internet. Our tech department has done a great job in providing multiple applications to help students create projects, take notes, etc.</p>
<p>Q38. How do we get Chromebooks if we choose edmentum? Chromebooks will be distributed from the student's home school.</p>
<p>Look for details to come by 8/28 on distribution plans. Details will be posted on the district web-site.</p>

Attendance:

Q39. What level of attendance is required in comprehensive distance learning? What happens if your child can't be in class at the appointed time?

Attendance guidance will be coming out on August 11th and will be updated.

Q40. How is attendance different from Edmentum and CDL? Is it at specific time in both, or do families have the ability to be flexible with the schedule (such as taking attendance at 10am instead of 8am)?

- A. LCSD follows state mandates guided by the Oregon Department of Education. As it states today (8/7/2020) "Attendance must be taken at least once per day for all students enrolled in school, regardless of the instructional model."
- B. Edmentum's (Study Island, Exact Path & Courseware) provides students/families the flexibility to set an instructional schedule that works for them. Students are still expected to be working towards grade level proficiency in Study Island and growth on their individualized learning path (Exact Path) daily. Courseware students (secondary) should be working towards course completion daily.
- C. Comprehensive Distance Learning students will have set scheduled times for instruction, collaboration, etc.

Q41. If a child misses class in CDL does that affect their grade?

- A. Regular attendance is valuable in school and work. The district may establish grading policies that permit teachers to consider a student's attendance in determining the student's grade, but student attendance may not be the sole criterion. For more information, please refer to LCSD Policy: [IKAD](#) and [IKAD-AR](#).

Q42. Does attendance need to happen within certain hours or is it anytime in the 24 hour day?

E-Learning students have the flexibility to create the instructional schedule that works for their child and family. Students in both secondary and elementary should be working towards course completion and/or progressing daily in their instructional programs.

Q43. If children are unable to log in daily, because of attendance daily; how will this affect their overall grades?

See Question #41 if a student is enrolled in Comprehensive Distance Learning. If a child is enrolled in LCSD E-Learning option, students are graded on course assessments, assignments, etc.

Q44. Can you explain more about the attendance requirement? Will it affect grades for our children?

See Question #41
Q45. Is funding to LCSD tied to daily attendance? What is the min. time each day to achieve funding for LCSD?
A. Public Schools are funded through state income taxes, lottery funds, property taxes and federal funding. Allocation of that funding is based on Average Daily Membership (the number of students enrolled in a school district), not on daily attendance. While attendance is not directly related to funding, research shows that kids who attend school consistently are more successful.
Q.46 What if our child gets sick? Do we email the school, or log-in and tell a teacher? Can students make up their work?
With the flexibility our online program offers students/families, students do not have a specific time they must be online. This schedule is set by the student & parents themselves. Students will need to make up their instruction time once they become well enough to be a learner. This will cause additional work and more time spent catching up in order to meet course requirements.
IEP/504/ELD Questions
Q47. What if the child has an IEP? Will students with IEPs have extra help?
Guidance from Oregon Department of Education (ODE) for special education services during hybrid and/or online only is slated to be released on August 11th; more information will be available after that date. The IEP team will need to have a meeting to discuss any changes that may potentially need to happen to the IEP.
Q48. Would speech therapy still be accessible?
Guidance from Oregon Department of Education (ODE) for special education services during hybrid and/or online only is slated to be released on August 11th; more information will be available after that date. The IEP team will need to have a meeting to discuss any changes that may potentially need to happen to the IEP.
Q49. Can ELD students enroll in Edmentum? If so, do they have access to additional support and/or bilingual access?
Guidance from Oregon Department of Education (ODE) for English Language services during hybrid and/or online only is slated to be released on August 11th, so the following could change after that time.

Elementary: There are language translations of the text available via a translation tool. Students have also utilized Google translate. Students who qualify for ELD services will be provided those services through LCSD but will remain an Edmentum student for their core content learning. Edmentum provides program support for parents in Spanish and English.

Secondary: There are language translations of the text available via a translation tool. Students have also utilized Google translate. They will be enrolled in one period of CDL ELD for support but remain an Edmentum student.

Q50. Will this program work for students pursuing an IEP diploma?

Guidance from Oregon Department of Education (ODE) for special education services during hybrid and/or online only is slated to be released on August 11th; more information will be available after that date. The IEP team will need to have a meeting to discuss any changes that may potentially need to happen to the IEP.

Q51. Is there a separate program set up for IEP students?

At this time, the online only program is Edmentum.

Q52. Do we wait to register until we know what program to go with and until info on the IEP details come out?

You can wait; please register by the end date of registration. Guidance from Oregon Department of Education (ODE) for special education services during hybrid and/or online only is slated to be released on August 11th; more information will be available after that date. The IEP team will need to have a meeting to discuss any changes that may potentially need to happen to the IEP.

Q53. What about the kids in AVID and going for an IEP diploma? Do they have to sign up for a certain program?

AVID is not offered via the e-Learning option (Edmentum). You would sign up for CDL or e-learning; with any IEP related happenings being completed by the student's "home" school (i.e. Taft Elementary, Newport HS, etc....)

Q54. How do we know what each program will offer for those students on 504 plans or IEP with the autism spectrum? Can she transfer back if she is not working well with edmentum?

In the K-6 portion, there are some accommodations such as read the text aloud that can be checked off for a student. As it is an online program there are limitations to the accommodations that can be made. At this time, moving from one program to the other would need to happen at the 9 week mark(s). Guidance from Oregon Department of Education (ODE) for special education services during hybrid and/or online only is slated to be released on August 11th; more information will be available

after that date. The IEP team will need to have a meeting to discuss any changes that may potentially need to happen to the IEP.

Q55. What's happening for the special ed kids?

At this time, students who receive special education services will have access to either CDL or Edmentum. Guidance from Oregon Department of Education (ODE) for special education services during hybrid and/or online only is slated to be released on August 11th; more information will be available after that date. The IEP team will need to have a meeting to discuss any changes that may potentially need to happen.

Additional Questions

Q56. Who should we contact for more details?

Q57. One hour of tutoring support per week for all secondary Edmentum students combined? Correct?

Secondary students will be provided scheduled office hours to receive support in content areas. It is important to utilize content area tutors to support academic progress, answer questions, and get additional feedback/support, as needed. Each core content area will have one scheduled hour per week to help support our district students.

Q58. Will all of this info be available on the district website after this meeting?

Yes, we have created a FAQ and will upload the Elementary and Secondary slides from tonight's presentation to our district website.

Q59. Will the students that are doing college classes along with their high school classes still be able to take college classes?

Students enrolled in Early College will still be able to take Early College courses. Students wanting to take dual credit courses will need to enroll in the CDL option.

Q60. What about kids on variance, can they participate in their 'home' school vs. area activities?

Participation requirements for after school activities for students on a variance will remain the same. Contact your building principal or athletic director for more information.

Q61. Can you discuss the four courses per term? Will there basically be 9 week quarters this year? Does that mean a student will only take math in the 1st and 3rd quarters?

Building principals and counselors are creating master schedules that reflect ~9 week terms that result in a .5 credit for each course per term. To earn 1 math credit, a student will need to take a minimum of two terms. Some courses may run a straight ~18 weeks and some may split up over the course of the year. This four course per term schedule will apply to Edmentum and CDL 9-12th grade students. Middle schools have slightly more flexibility with instructional time. Building principals and counselors will be directly involved in appropriately scheduling middle school students in Edmentum to best mirror their building education plan.

Q62. Can youth take more than 4 courses?

Additional course enrollment is determined by the building principal and counselor. In a "regular" year, students have the opportunity to earn 7 credits. In the 20-21 school year, students will have the opportunity to earn 8 credits.

Q63. CDL will have assigned teachers then?

Yes, students will be assigned four LCSD certified teachers through Comprehensive Distance Learning. One teacher for each class period on a daily basis.

Q64. What are the recommendations for single parents that need to work full time? What about parents who still work full time?

Contact your building administrator to discuss your individual needs and help decide which option to choose.

Q65. I'm curious if there is something in the works for kids/parents to be able to interact outside of the regularly scheduled classes with CDL?

Buildings are looking at ways to run virtual clubs and events until we are allowed to meet in-person again. Athletic Directors are also meeting to plan events for students to be physically active, even when we cannot meet together in teams on our campus.

Q66. Are there any other programs that are not online for the 20-21 school year?

The options that are being offered by Lincoln County School District are: 1. Comprehensive Distance Learning or 2. Online E-Learning. On July 28, 2020 Governor Brown placed health and safety metrics that govern school districts' ability to reopen. Right now it is hard to say when our hybrid model will be in place due to multiple variables that are out of our control. LCSD can say, once metrics are met, our plan is to carefully transition into our hybrid learning model.

Q67. What do we need to purchase supply wise? For elementary students doing CDL?

Supply lists are uploaded onto school websites
Q68. For those students that have incompletes for the spring term 2020, is Edmentum an option for catch up or completion.
Please contact your student's building principal for questions around their Credit Assurance Plan drafted in the Spring of 2020. They will guide you in the best option for credit completion. It may be Edmentum, but they may also have a different plan to support your student.
Q69. How will state tests be addressed if they are in edmentum?
State tests will happen in the Spring. We will continue to get guidance from ODE on how state tests will be administered to our off-campus students.
Q70. If we choose CDL and we have a medically high risk family member can we still stay online?
Yes. We will work with families every ~9 weeks to make sure the learning option selected is the best fit for the student and family. If LCSD returns to hybrid after 10 weeks, the student may need to switch to the Edmentum platform.
Q71. If neither of these programs are a good fit for my child, what options are available? I heard LCSD is at the 3% cap for online charter schools.
<p>Oregon learning options for families include Public School (including Public Charter Schools and Online Public Charter Schools - these schools are tuition free and curriculum/instruction is provided), Home School (education provided in the home by the parent/guardian, who is responsible for all curriculum and record keeping), and Private School (parents are responsible for choosing a school/program and all associated costs).</p> <p>If more than three percent of the students who reside in a school district are enrolled in online public charter schools that are not sponsored by the school district, <u>students must receive approval from the school district before enrolling in an online public charter school</u>. School districts have the option of denying these transfer requests, per ORS 338.125(4). Lincoln County School District has reached this 3% cap and is not approving any further transfer requests for online public charter schools.</p>
Q72. Are charter schools an option as well even though your at 3%.
If a Public Charter School is not an Online Public Charter School (but rather, they serve students primarily in a physical location rather than online), standard policies re: inter-district and intra-district transfers apply (see LCSD Policies JECC and JECF). A

<p>notice of intent to enroll is only used for virtual public charter schools and is not a part of the process for non-virtual public charter schools.</p>
<p>Q72. What about connections academy? Is that an option?</p>
<p>Oregon Connections Academy (formerly Oregon Charter Academy) is a virtual public charter school. LCSD is currently not approving transfers to any Oregon virtual/online charter schools.</p>
<p>Q73. How is edmentum different from connection academy online or k12 online program? As educators why do you like edmentum for our kids and our district? Why did as a district you did not go with a parson packed program online?</p>
<p>Elementary: Three different companies were considered to support an online program for K-6. Edmentum's programs had the best options for our LCSD students. Secondary: LCSD has been using the Edmentum program for our on-campus and off campus E-learning platform. We chose to continue with the same program already in place and known by our students and staff and integrated with our systems.</p>
<p>Q74. Will students who are enrolled in CDL be required to attend school when it opens again, or would they be able to stay CDL?</p>
<p>Elementary: Students not wishing to or are unable to attend our hybrid model will need to transfer to Edmentum at the term. Secondary: Students not wishing to or able to enroll in CDL will need to transfer to Edmentum at the term.</p>
<p>Q75. Would k12 online learning program be an option or the ORVA program?</p>
<p>At this time, Lincoln County School District has reached the 3% cap on enrollment in Oregon Public Online Charter Schools (such as ORVA). We are not approving any transfer requests to these Public Online Charter Schools.</p>
<p>Q76. When do you foresee hybrid starting again?</p>
<p>On July 28, 2020 Governor Brown placed health and safety metrics that govern school districts' ability to reopen. Right now it is hard to say when our hybrid model will be in place due to multiple variables that are out of our control. LCSD can say, once metrics are met, our plan is to carefully transition into our hybrid learning model.</p>
<p>Q78. Will there be zoom meetings for elementary and secondary separately?</p>
<p>August 13th. Elementary 5:00, Secondary 6:00, Special Education 7:00</p>

Q79. Do variances stay the same?
<p>Elementary: Yes, elementary variances will remain the same. Contact your building principal for more information.</p> <p>Secondary: Yes, secondary variances will remain the same. Contact your building principal for more information.</p>
Q80. If a student chooses Edmentum, does that affect eligibility for AVID scholarships and other potential benefits later in high school?
<p>A student enrolled in Edmentum online will not be able to be enrolled in AVID. They will still have access to their building college and career coordinator, ASPIRE Center, and counselor for post-secondary scholarship and application support.</p>
Q81. Will edmentum be available over the summer break for students who struggled or fell behind through all of this and need to make up some lost ground?
<p>Yes. Secondary students are able to enroll in summer courses through Edmentum.</p>
Q82. Can a child participate in school sports if they are part of edmentum?
